How the Synar report helps the Center for Substance Abuse Prevention

In accordance with the tobacco regulations, States are required to provide detailed information on progress made in enforcing youth tobacco access laws (FFY 2005 Compliance Progress) and future plans to ensure compliance with the Synar requirements to reduce youth tobacco access rates (FFY 2006 Intended Use Plan). These data are required by 42 U.S.C. 300x-26 and will be used by the Secretary to evaluate State compliance with the statute. Part of the mission of the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration's (SAMHSA) Center for Substance Abuse Prevention (CSAP) is to assist States by supporting Synar activities and providing technical assistance helpful in determining the type of enforcement measures and control strategies that are most effective. This information is helpful to SAMHSA/CSAP in improving technical assistance resources and expertise on enforcement efforts and tobacco control program support activities, including State Synar Program support services, through an enhanced technical assistance program involving conferences and workshops, development of training materials and guidance documents, and on-site technical assistance consultation.

How the Synar report can help States

The information gathered for the Synar report can help States describe and analyze sub-State needs for program enhancements. These data can also be used to report to the State legislature and other State and local organizations on progress made to date in enforcing youth tobacco access laws when aggregated statistical data from State Synar reports can demonstrate to the Secretary the national progress in reducing youth tobacco access problems. This information will also provide Congress with a better understanding of State progress in implementing Synar, including State difficulties and successes in enforcing retailer compliance with youth tobacco access laws.

Briefly describe all checked activities:

The Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse developed an educational packet on tobacco use prevention and control, with 2 fact sheets that specifically address the law on youth tobacco access prohibition. These fact sheets are distributed to all tobacco vendors, who are encouraged to display these to their employees and to use these when orienting new employees. These facts sheets are provided to new vendors during the initial process of obtaining a license and during the renewal of licenses. In addition, the DMHSA also conducted an orientation for all Mobil Oil Guam, Inc. employees on regarding the law on youth tobacco access prohibition. DMHSA makes this orientation available to all employers upon request.

Vendors who comply with the law are awarded a "Certificate of Compliance" on the spot.

At community forums, results of the SYNAR inspections and the implications of youth access restriction on reducing youth tobacco use are routinely presented as part of Guam's tobacco control research agenda.

For 2005, the Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse awarded sub-contracts through a Request for Proposal process using MSA funding to support youth-oriented tobacco control and prevention work by two non-profit community organizations: (Sanctuary, Inc. and Inafa' Maolek). These community organizations primarily focused on tobacco control and prevention among youth. Music videos and theatrical productions were created and presented throughout the Guam community and primarily with students in the elementary, middle and high schools.

Media is used to publicize the compliance inspection results, through both a paid announcement and press releases. Data were also presented at meetings in collaboration with the American Cancer Society, the University of Guam Tobacco Control research Advisory Group, and the community tobacco control coalition. SYNAR data helped augment presentations providing evidence in support of a smoke free public places policy/law.

Guam's SYNAR abstracts were accepted for oral presentations at the following tobacco control conferences: 1) "Guam's SYNAR Experience 1999-2004: Asking the Right Questions", National Conference on Tobacco or Health: May 4-6, 2005, Chicago, Illinois; 2) Restricting Youth Access to Tobacco: The Guam Experience 1999-2003, 7th Annual Asia-Pacific Conference on Tobacco or Health, September 15-18, 2004, Korea.

	For 2005, Guam's SYNAR team training of both youth and adult inspectors were held twice prior to the day of inspections on March 12, 2005 and August 20, 2005 respectively. Also, this will be done for FFY 2006, with multiple training sessions offered to experienced adult and youth inspectors as well as new inspectors who may be just recruited.
	Guam will continue its educational and advocacy efforts to enhance awareness of its youth tobacco access laws. Guam also intends to continue its current practice of citing and applying the collection of fines at the time of inspection to ensure compliance with the law.

Briefly describe all items checked above:

Guam faces some challenges in complying with the SYNAR regulation.

- Limited resources for law enforcement of youth access laws the number of enforcement personnel is extremely limited within the Department of Revenue and Taxation.
- Limitation on completeness and accuracy of list of tobacco outlets The accuracy of tobacco listing has not improved since the last inspection for FFY 2005. The physical addresses of tobacco outlets are difficult to locate using the existing maps for Guam. The Guam Bureau of Land Management is currently developing an updated map of Guam.
- Geographic, demographic and logistical considerations Because of periodic hurricanes, many street signs are battered or non-existent, making identification of minor streets problematic. A significant proportion of tobacco shop owners are Korean and Vietnamese, and occasionally, language barriers are encountered. In addition, Guam's public agencies have no jurisdiction and access to tobacco vendors inside military installments; thus, these establishments are not inspected for compliance.
- Cultural factors As a small island, many Guam residents know and are familiar with each other. This has resulted in numerous instances where either the youth inspector or the adult inspector is recognized by the tobacco vendor. Also, it is not an uncommon practice in many villages for adults to request children to buy cigarettes for them.
- Other factors Data from Guam's 2002 Youth Tobacco Survey (YTS) revealed that majority of Guam's youth obtain their cigarettes from non-commercial sources, limiting the Synar regulation's ability to impact in a meaningful way on youth tobacco use. In fact, while youth tobacco use rates did drop markedly in 1999, when Guam enacted its version of the Synar regulation, the decrease was not maintained, and for Middle School students, tobacco use rates are increasing. Overall, Guam's youth tobacco rates are significantly higher that the average on the US mainland. This indicates the need for complementary approaches that address the need to reduce the demand for tobacco products, in addition to the Synar regulation, which address the reduction of the supply of tobacco for youth.
